The third of our annual debates centres upon the causes of the outbreak of the First World War. Tensions in Europe accelerated rapidly after the assassination of Franz Ferdinand in July 1914. The day of the assassination will be explored in depth revealing the calamities and fiasco surrounding the State Visit.

The debate will concentrate upon the motives and aspirations of four main political players, each attempting to justify their actions. The interactions and behind-the-scenes manoeuvrings of Germany, Russia, Austria-Hungary and Serbia will be explored. The audience will be asked to consider and vote on which of these four powers played the greatest part in bringing about the war at that particular time. The debate promises to be stormy and contentious as the ideologies of four different cultures come into conflict.
